## My Mandarin experience by Kishan V

Dumplings: On Wednesday the 6th of February, on the second day of Chinese New Year we made dumplings. Miss Wang showed us how to make the dumplings. We learnt how to roll out and



fold the dough around our filling. We also were provided with soy sauce as a dip. It was delicious for me and my family.

# 新年好 Happy New Year by Joel H

During the last week it has been Chinese New Year, throughout the week the Mandarin students enjoyed a variety of activities to celebrate, we also performed an assembly to the rest of KS3 (Year 7, 8 & 9). We all enjoyed the last week and the activities that it bought.

Monday 4<sup>th</sup> February-Chinese New Year's Eve Last Monday we experienced a celebration with the Kung Fu Master we learnt a variety of Chinese arts including: Kung Fu, Tai Chi and Lion dancing.

# Kung Fu

During Period 1 the Kung Fu Master taught us a variety of Kung Fu techniques including 'Ma Bu' (horse stance in English) where you have to stand in a squat position and punch at the same time as making the noise Hua! We were also taught a lot of stretches to warm us up for the Kung Fu routine that followed.

#### Tai Chi

Tai Chi is a lot calmer and flows more than Kung Fu. In Tai Chi the Kung Fu Master taught us a basic, rhythmic routine which the entire class tried our best to copy (although this is not as easy as it seems). It very much surprised us when the final move was a stamp with the right foot given this is not as calm as the other moves. During this exercise you must be calm and, most importantly, move quietly and slowly to get the calm effect across.

#### Lion Dancing

During the end of Period 3 we learnt how to move a lion's head, and body to portray different emotionsthis is known as lion dancing. To make the lion happy you must use one hand to pump and once this is complete you must use the other hand. To make the lion angry you pump both arms at the same time. And to make the lion sleep you must pull on the levers and this will make the eyes close (so if you pull one string you can make the lion wink!

## Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> February

On the 6<sup>th</sup> February the students who study Mandarin performed an assembly in order to celebrate Chinese New Year. We performed an assembly to the rest of KS3 explaining Chinese New Year to the students, during this Year 7 also performed a song (新年好呀) which tells you what Chinese people do at Chinese New Year. Miss Li awarded prizes to students who won the Chinese New Year quiz.

# St George's Hospital Trip

Mr Neylan and Mrs Sangster took 23 Year 12 students to St George's Hospital, University of London in Tooting on Wednesday to find out about medical degrees.

St George's had laid on a fantastic programme, meeting academic staff and students. Students were given good advice about applications, grades, personal statements, and volunteering experience, all of which are essential for successful applicants for medicine. Some time was spent in a lecture in St George's specimen museum where some of the body parts and organs were up to two hundred years old.

After lunch, there were two clinic workshops. One workshop focused on Physiotherapy. The other workshop was based in St George's training ward, no live patients, just manikins, where students practiced CPR, measured lung capacity and reflexes, amongst other things. It was a full-on insight into what studying for medicine is like.

# Students on Site - one arriving at 6.40am on last week!

A reminder that there are still an increasing number of students arriving particularly early in the morning and staying late into the evening. The school actually opens for students at 8.00am in the morning and we would encourage all students (unless they are remaining for pre-arranged activities) to have left the site by 5.00pm.







As the title suggests, one student arrived at 6.40am in the morning last week – just ten minutes after the first member of the site team – as we hope you understand, this is really not acceptable.

The school is unable to ensure there is a qualified first aider on site before 8.00am in the morning and after 4.30pm in the evening. This request is being made as we are unable to supervise students outside of these times and we can therefore take no responsibility for them, should they be involved in any form of accident.

## **Safety and Courtesy**

On a more serious note, we would like to remind parents, students and staff to continue to be respectful of our neighbours and not park across their driveways. The safety of our students continues to be our utmost priority and so we also ask that, if you are dropping off or collecting your son or daughter, you abide by the road markings and refrain from parking on zig-zags or double yellow lines.

We have also received a couple of calls from members of the public about parents dropping students in the morning actually on the roundabout at the top of Bourne Road – close to Dartfordians. This is obviously extremely dangerous not just for other road users, but also for the students themselves. We would urge that parents please find a safe place to drop-off their child/children for school.
