Today is St David's Day

St David – or *Dewi Sant* in Welsh – was born on the south-west coast of Wales, near to where the city of St David's is today.

One of the famous stories about St David is from when he was speaking to a large crowd and someone shouted "We won't be able to see or hear him." Then, the ground David sood on is said to have risen up so that he was standing on a hill, making it easier for everyone to see him.

It is said that he lived for more than 100 years and died on Tueday 1 March 589.

wearing daffodils and leeks, both recognised symbols of Wales and Saint David respectively, eating traditional Welsh food including cawl and Welsh rarebit, and women wearing traditional Welsh dress.


Calum P, Ife N, and Nikola W were all awarded the top prize in their category.


Matthew S, William A, Roderic B, George P, Louie S, Sudershan R and Sam P were all awarded the Highly Commeded Certifcate of Merit.



Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesay

Pancake Day, or Shrove Tuesday, is the traditional feast day before the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday. Lent – the 40 days leading up to Easter – was traditionally a time of fasting and on Shrove Tuesday, Anglo-Saxon Christians went to confession and were "shriven" (absolved from their sins). A bell would be rung to call people to confession. This came to be called the "Pancake Bell" and is still rung today.

Shrove Tuesday was the last opportunity to use up eggs and fats before embarking on the Lenten fast and pancakes are the perfect way of using up these ingredients.

The ingredients for pancakes can be seen to symbolise four points of significance at this time of year:

Egg: Creation Flour: The staff of life Salt: Wholesomeness Milk: Purity (Information from <u>https://www.historic-uk.com/CultureUK/Pancake-Day/</u>)

What will you be topping your pancakes with?

Students on Site - one arriving at 6.40am earlier this term!

A reminder that there are still an increasing number of students arriving particularly early in the morning and staying late into the evening. On a more serious note, we would like to remind parents, students and staff to continue to be respectful of our neighbours and not park across their driveways. The safety of our students continues to be our utmost priority and so we also ask that, if you are dropping off or collecting your son or daughter, you abide by the road markings and refrain from parking on zig-zags or double yellow lines.

We have also received a couple of calls from members of the public about parents dropping students in the morning actually on the roundabout at the top of Bourne Road – close to Dartfordians. This is obviously extremely dangerous not just for other road users, but also for the students themselves. We would urge that parents please find a safe place to drop-off their child/children for school.
