
Language and Culture Week

Year 11 Students receive Honours Ties

Following the excellent results of the GCSE early entry exams we were delighted to award "Honours Ties" to a number of student in Year 11. The Ties are awarded to students who have demonstrated a sustained and significant commitment to serving the school and/or wider community. It is recognition of exceptional academic scholarship, outstanding contribution to the life of the school and clear endorsement of the school values.

An Honours Tie is reserved for Senior School students and it will replace the student's current House tie. The tie is navy and gold and is gifted to the student along with a certificate. Students who are eligible for an Honours Tie will be determined by the awards panel which will be made up of Deputy Headteacher and the Head of Year. They will consider carefully that:

- The achievement reflects the long term commitment to and success of the students' academic studies and wider school activities.
- The achievement brings honour to the school.
- The student is abiding by the school rules and behaving in line with expectations.

At Beths, academic expectations are central to our purpose. We strive to ensure that talent is nurtured and learning is valued. Every day challenge is welcomed, participation is expected and achievement is prized and celebrated. We are committed to educating well-rounded individuals who










Outstanding Performance at Early Entry GCSE (Year 11)

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My visit to the Anne Frank Museum by Ewan, 7W

During my holiday in Holland, I visited the Anne Frank Museum (in Amsterdam).

Here is some information that I learned there.

Otto Frank - Anne's father - started fighting for Germany in World War One in 1914. He later on got his rank of lieutenant in 1917 and later earned his first class Iron Cross. This is an impressive German military award.

Otto met Edith (Anne's mother) in 1924 and married her in 1925. Margot (Anne's sister) was born in 1926 with Anne in 1929. When Anne was four years old in 1933 she migrated to Holland with her family due to the difficulties of being Jewish in Germany at that time.

After World War One, Germany was left very poor due to having to pay for the damages it caused. The Germans were suffering and Hitler's promises gave them hope; he was therefore elected chancellor democratically in 1933; he later became a dictator.

In Holland, Otto made a business called Opekta selling pectin and spices. After a little while, the children started schooling at Montessori Lyceum Amsterdam.

Germany invaded Holland in 1940; this made life very difficult for the Jewish people. Jews had to wear a yellow star to go outside - they had to pay for them, so if they couldn't afford enough for the whole family, not all of them could go outside together at once. They also were not allowed to use public transport, they could only go to specific shops as well as restaurants and they could only go out between the hours of 6AM and 8PM.

In 1942 Jews were starting to be taken away to labour camps and sadly Margot got called for one. At that instant, the Franks went to the secret annex in the building of Otto's company that he had prepared over a period of time. A week later the Van Pels joined them. The families knew each other as Hermann Van Pels worked for Otto's company. Four months later, the family was joined by another person named Fritz Pfeffer who was an acquaintance of the family. Over the whole time of being there Anne had grown 13 cm taller. They had hid for two years until they were betrayed by an unknown person.

When the Franks were discovered they were sent to concentration camps. Margot was sent to one with Anne; their parents were sent to different ones. Sadly, Otto was the only survivor as Margot and Anne died of Typhoid (a disease caused by bites from the many lice in their blankets) with Edith who died of starvation. When Otto got out of the camp he knew about his deceased wife but he wasn't sure about his children, so he made a small article in a newspaper to find them. Later on he found out that they were dead as well.

Luckily, Miep Gies, the last living person in the group who helped hide the Jewish families in the Annex from the Nazis had saved the diary that Anne had written in whilst she was hidden and gave it to Otto who published it so everyone can know about her life.

Did you know that it was Anne's dream to become a world famous writer? Now she is as you can still read her diary today! It has been translated in to 70 languages.

I enjoyed visiting this museum and learning about this part of history, although it was very sad.

Students on Site

We know that students love to spend as much time as they possibly can here at Beths Grammar. However, please can we remind parents and carers that the school actually opens to students at 8.00am in the morning and, unless there are any pre-arranged activities, students should have left the site by 5.00pm. The reason for this is that, even though there may be staff on site, they are there to either prepare the school for the start of the day, or remain on site to deal with evening lettings.

When students are on site before or after they should be, we are unable to ensure their safety especially as our qualified first aiders are in school between the hours of 8.00am and 4.30pm only. This request is being made as we are unable to supervise students outside of these times and we can therefore take no responsibility for them, should they be involved in any form of accident.

Thinking of our neighbours and our local community

We would like to take this opportunity to remind parents, students and staff to continue to be respectful of our neighbours and not to park across their driveways. The safety of our students continues to be our utmost priority and so we also ask that, if you are dropping off or collecting your son or daughter, you abide by the road markings and refrain from parking on zig-zags or double yellow lines.







We are also aware that some parents drop students in the morning actually on the roundabout at the top of Bourne Road – close to Dartfordians. This is extremely dangerous - not just for other road users - but also for the students themselves. We would urge that parents please find a safe place to drop-off their child/children for school.

Finally, we continue to remind students to take care when queuing for buses after the school day and would ask if you could also remind your son or daughter, that would be very helpful.
