Coronavirus (COVID-19) – updates from the Headteacher

As we move into another week of isolation and into, what would have been the first week of the summer term, we hope that you are all continuing to cope with what is a huge change to our normal way of living.

Unfortunately, Covid-19 does not worry whether you're rich or poor, living in the world of show-business or in Bexleyheath and we are now probably at a stage where many of us have lost a family member or friend, an old work colleague or acquaintance. The hope is that, with the order to stay at home, the numbers of those becoming infected and those dying, will soon start to reduce and our lives will, gradually begin to be less restrictive.

However, for now we have to remain at home and try to continue to maintain a sense of perspective through these very strange times. We are still at a point that we don't know when schools will return and whether that will be during this summer term, or September or even beyond.

Any calendared events that would normally take place will now not happen – they will either be cancelled or postponed to a later date.

Newcastle pulled out all the stops to impress their would-be buyers – Poundland – looks like Mike Ashley got a good deal there. Joelene re-entered the scoring charts having been anonymous for most of the season and the Longstaff boys hit the target as well. West Ham duly turned up without their barn-door at the back and as a result conceded more than they had bargained for. Mark Noble was less so getting his marching orders from the referee after 70 minutes. A late rally from the Hammers pulled the deficit back with goals from Cresswell, Antonio and a recently resurrected Wilshere.

Bournemouth nicked a point at Old Trafford with a brace from the Wilson boys which kept their Premier league dreams alive at the said Theatre although the United performance bordered upon farcical before comedic and then tragic having been ahead through Martial and Fred, conceded via a poor back-pass and then de Gea dropped the ball over the line thus confirming this to be one of his better seasons at the club.
