Contrary to the student planners, which were produced ahead of lockdown, we will no longer be having a Year 6 Open Event on Saturday 9 October so school WILL BE OPEN TO ALL STAFF AND STUDENTS, AS NORMAL, ON MONDAY 12 OCTOBER.

We have a number of students who are coming to school in football/rugby boots and wearing them throughout the entire school day. Walking on a hard service with football boots on is unhealthy for your feet and, over time, also wears down your studs, affecting your game and also can cause serious injury to other players as they can become sharp. Additionally, it means that, especially with the current wet weather, mud is continuously being brought into the school and this takes our cleaners away from their role to sanitise classrooms and corridors for the safety of us all – which is obviously more important in the current climate. If your child has football/rugby/Games he must come into school in trainers and change into his boots once on the field.

A reminder to students that, once they leave the school site, they are breaking the law if they mix in groups of more than six.

We have received numerous reports, not only from our neighbours in the Village, but also from retailers and restaurant owners in Bexleyheath that our students are not adhering to these rules. Please can you again reiterate the importance of why your son or daughter should adhere to the 'rule of six'.

If your son or daughter is tested for Covid-19, please alert the school and do not allow them to return to Beths until they have received a negative test result. Again, should they are unfortunate enough to test positive, please inform the school immediately so that we can alert the LCRC for for guidance.

We have had complaints from our neighbours on Hartford Road, who have told us that vehicles are still blocking their driveways as they drop students off. Additionally, staff have reported that parents are dropping students off by the gates and stopping on the yellow zig zag lines. Please note that even stopping on these lines is illegal and we have noticed an increase in traffic wardens in this area. We again, remind parents not to use Hartford Road but instead, drop students either at Hall Place where they have given permission, or alternatively, drop them at a distance for them to walk the rest of the way into school.



Our Great Beths Bake Off continues this week with Mr Neylan taking up the gauntlet with bread week. Mr Neylan has opted to share his bread cake recipe - heralding from Sheffield, this reminds him of his local home town. These are really easy to bake and we would love to see you try them!

Ingredients

- 1.5 lb (675 g) strong white flour
- *Half-ounce fresh yeast (preferred) or 1 teaspoon dried yeast*
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- 4 oz (113 g) lard (or 'Trex' could be used as a lighter substitute)
- 2 teaspoons salt
- Three-quarters of a pint (400 ml/15 fl oz) lukewarm water

Method

- 1. Mix the flour, dried yeast, sugar and salt in a big bowl. If using fresh yeast, cream it with the sugar and a little of the water then add it to the flour and salt.
- 2. Mix to a smooth dough with the rest of the water, knead, then leave to rise.









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- 3. Knock it back when risen.
- 4. Cut the lard into small pieces and press these into the dough.
- 5. Shape the dough into one big, or two smaller, flat rounds, leaving it lumpy with the lard.
- 6. Put on to a greased baking sheet and leave to prove.
- 7. When the dough has almost doubled in size, coat it with beaten egg, if you would like to see a darker colour, and bake it

initially for 10 minutes on the bottom of a pre-heated oven at 425 F/mark 7/220 C, then reduce the temperature to 375 F/gas mark 5/190 C and bake for another 20-35 minutes (depending on whether you have cooked one large or two small loaves) until the bread reaches a golden colour. Test to see it is cooked by tapping the bottom of the bread - if it sounds hollow you should be in business!

Guidance on use of face covering when travelling to school or college

Children aged 11 and over are legally required to <u>wear a face</u> covering on public transport in England, unless exempt for health, age or disability reasons.

In accordance with advice from Public Health England, we recommend that local authorities advise children and young people aged 11 and over to wear a face covering when travelling on dedicated school transport, unless they are exempt. Coronavirus (COVID-19) usually spreads by droplets from coughs, sneezes and speaking. When used correctly, wearing a face covering may reduce the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19) droplets in certain circumstances, helping to protect others.

Schools should support local authorities in promoting the use of face coverings when travelling to and from school, and help them to resolve any issues of non-compliance where appropriate.

The <u>'Hands. Face. Space.' campaign</u> urges everyone to continue to wash their hands, cover their face and make space to control infection rates. The NHS has released a <u>'Hands. Face.
