
## Messages from Mr Blyghton, Headteacher

Firstly may I wish you a very happy Christmas! We have finally reached the end of what has been a very difficult and different Autumn Term for us all. I would like to say a very big thank you to all parents and students for bearing with us as and when we have had to ask year groups or parts of, to self isolate and switch to remote learning, the majority have been very understanding as to why this has been done. Your support really has been very much appreciated.

As you know, staff are due to return on Wednesday 6 January – for our INSET day – and we then should be welcoming some students back into school from Thursday 7 January. However, please look out for a letter from me after the New Year, in case there have been any changes to guidance from the Government as to what their expectations regarding the opening of schools, for instance, is at that time.

We are also currently receiving details for testing of staff and those students who have been identified as having had close contact with someone who has tested positive to Covid-19. These details are still in their infancy and, again, as soon as we know exactly what the expectations are and how these will be implemented, I will be in touch.

The Old Vic's 'live' performance of a Christmas Carol, which was watched by Year 7 and 8 students on Wednesday, was a great success—the technology worked and, even though for a moment we thought that 7B were going to be watching a totally different ageinappropriate production, at the last minute (or two minutes behind the rest of the students), the right

## Messages from Mr Blyghton, Headteacher (continued)

#### **Arrangements For the School Day from January 2021**

I have attached a copy of the plan for your perusal. It has been a lengthy process to ensure that bubbles were respected, students and staff were kept safe and afternoon lessons in school for Year 12 were reinstated. Below is a summary of the changes:

<u>Key Stage 3</u>: Lunch will be between 12:00—12:40 which is a shortening of 5 minutes. The school day will finish at 15:15 which is 5 minutes later than currently. Registration for Year 7 and Year 9 will be at 8:45 and for Year 8 at 9:00. Students will be allowed on site up to 30 minutes before their registration.

**Key Stage 4**: Lunch will be between 12:50—13:50 which is 10 minutes earlier than currently and is shortened back to an hour. The afternoon session will be 13:50 –15:30 which is longer than at present to take account of the lost learning time from this term. Both changes are in line with timings pre-March lockdown. Registration for Year 11 will be at 8:45 and for Year 10 at 9:00. Students will be allowed on site up to 30 minutes before their registration.

**Key Stage 5**: Year 12 are expected in for Registration at 8:45 on the days they have a session 1. Year 13 will be expected to follow the Registration pattern established this term. They will have a timetabled classroom break of 10 minutes during session 1 and will finish session 2 for lunch at 12:50. They will be afforded a 40 minute lunch break. The afternoon session will be from 13:30-15:00 and Year 13 will have the opportunity to work in the LRC until 16:30, if they wish.

The shortening of the lunch period for the Sixth Form has not been taken lightly —it was originally proposed to be 30 minutes. I was faced with the dilemma of where do I accommodate over 700 students on-site for that period of time, therefore the lunch options for Year 12 and Year 13 are, bring a packed lunch, buy lunch on the way to school, avail themselves of the Canteen from no earlier than 12:50 as the Canteen is used as a thoroughfare by Year 7 until 12:40 or quickly go into Bexley Village to get food. In all cases, students are expected to be in their afternoon timetabled lessons at 13:30. Therefore students will not be expected to travel to Bexleyheath Shopping Centre to get their lunch as there is not enough time to do so between 12:50 and 13:30. SLT will patrol the gate for latecomers and may turn them away as lessons become disrupted with constant interruptions and I believe punctuality is a valuable social skill to learn.

#### Rapid, Asymptomatic Testing for Schools

In the New Year schools and colleges are to be provided with rapid-result tests to help safeguard the health of the workforce and to keep as many students and staff in school as possible. This will help to identify asymptomatic cases, which make up a third of all cases, and help limit the spread of the virus.

At present we have limited information but understand that this will be implemented in a phased approach starting with secondary schools and colleges. The school workforce will be offered a weekly test (this is not compulsory) and will receive their result in approximately 30-minutes. In the event the result is positive they will have to isolate and take a second test that will be processed in a lab. If the test is negative, they will be able to carry on as usual.

The rapid-result tests will be coupled with serial testing for both staff and students who have been identified as a close contact of a positive case. With their consent, they will undergo a daily test for seven days. Once again, in the event of a positive test result, they will need to isolate and take a second test that will be processed in a lab. A negative result will enable them to continue uninterrupted with their work or education.

Whilst this is a positive step forward, it remains possible that an individual may still have the undetected disease and be infectious. It is therefore essential that everyone continues to follow good hygiene, wear a face covering as directed and observe social distancing measures, whether or not they have been tested. It is hoped that planning for the testing will commence early in the New Year with additional information being made available to you at the earliest opportunity.

#### **Paid Volunteer Opportunities**

Following the Government's announcement yesterday regarding the requirement for schools to test all staff weekly for Covid19 from January 2021, we are now looking to recruit for a variety of roles – both administrators and testers/processors – to undertake this requirement. Availability would need to be from the beginning of January and the roles will be on temporary rolling contracts with salary starting from £13.39 per hour depending upon age, experience, qualifications and job role. We currently envisage these roles to be Monday-Friday and would consider both full and part time.

The successful applicants will, of course, be required to be DBS checked by the school.

## YEAR 10 RECEIVE HONOURS TIES

On Tuesday 15 December, we were delighted to award the first batch of Honours Ties and certificates to 23 students in Year 10. Ties are awarded to students who have demonstrated a sustained and significant commitment to serving the school and/or wider community. It is recognition of exceptional academic scholarship, outstanding contribution to the life of the school and clear endorsement of the school values.

After what has been a challenging year it was great to spend time celebrating the evident achievement these students have made since starting their GCSE studies. The students who received these ties were delighted with their achievement. We look forward to awarding more Honours Ties as the year progresses.

This has been a very successful term for Year 10. Below gives you an indication of the progress we continue to make as a year group under such challenging times – this is a credit to the boys, staff and parents:

- **2,688 "outstanding" and "good" grades for attitude to learning and quality of homework** were issued on reports for boys across their 10 subjects outstanding achievement.
- **4 boys received straight "1" grades** for attitude to learning and quality of homework in their December report.
- Over **3,809** achievement points have been awarded for excellent work in lessons and engagement with learning.

From this time last year the number of behaviour points issued has decreased by 58%.

The average predicted GCSE grade across the year group is a **7H** (equivalent with the old "A" grade on the old A\*-U measure).

#### When tested for Covid...

If your son or daughter is tested for Covid-19, please alert the school and do not allow them to return until they have received a negative test result. Again, should they be unfortunate enough to test positive, please inform the school immediately so that we can alert the LCRC for guidance.

Similarly, should anyone within your household take a test for Covid-19, we ask that your child remain at home until the test results are known. If the result is positive, they will need to continue to remain at home isolating for 14 days from the start of the symptoms or, if there were none, for 14 days from the date the test was taken.

If you have any queries regarding isolation and what you should do, please contact the school and we will try to help you out.

We would also like to reassure you that we will also endeavour to include your son or daughter in lessons as they are taught. We have had some excellent lessons taking place within the classroom with absent students taking part at the same time via Zoom or Microsoft Teams.
