
Following the Anthony Nolan assembly on Friday 19 January, representatives from the charity were in school on Tuesday 23 January to run a 'Donor Recruitment event' to encourage as many of our Sixth Form students and staff, to sign up to become donors.

We were amazed and delighted that over 70 of our Sixth Form students signed up to be donors! There would have been even more had they all been able to – some for instance, weighed less than the required minimum weight and some (staff) were too old!

The Anthony Nolan Charity carries out some amazing work in helping to find suitable matches for bone marrow and stem cell transplant and in doing so, they help to save the lives of some very sick children and adults every day - all over the country. Sixth Form Parking

Many students in Year 13, and some in Year 12, have already passed their driving test. Although we encourage students to walk or use public transport to travel to and from school, there are still a number of students who choose to drive their own cars and park around the roads close by.

Since the start of term, we have dealt with a number of complaints from local residents complaining about loud music coming from stationary vehicles, poor parking restricting access to driveways/property and speeding, particularly on Hartford Road.

If students do choose to drive to school, we would appreciate your support in stressing to your son/daughter that:

- They should be mindful of our neighbours' access to and from driveways to their properties, even if a vehicle is parked 'legally';
- Should stationary vehicles cause an obstruction, this could result in a fixed penalty fine or possible towing away by the Police;
- Students driving to or from school should be fully road aware, and watch their speed;
- Not being able to find a place to park is not an excuse for arriving late to school.

We endeavour to maintain positive relationships with our neighbours. Thoughtless or irresponsible driving and parking can strain this relationship.
