




Michael Jordan's first ever sneaker



This shows how many people are willing to camp out, to get a new pair of sneakers.




This is a practice narrative, which I started in English class, in preparation for my GCSE English Language creative writing exam.



#### **Eye Contact:**

Eye contact is very key when it comes to public speaking. If you don't look at your audience, it makes you seem unconfident. As well as this, maintaining eye contact means that you can keep your audience engaged throughout the entire speech.

#### Hand Gestures::

Keeping your hands clasped or in your pockets throughout the speech also shows a lack of confidence. Use hand gestures to explain new concepts to the audience. For example, if you were talking about how big a house is, you can use your hands to make a large gap , in order to show just how massive the house is.

#### **Project your voice:**

This section describes the actions and roles of the staff at the school, who do not teach a subject but still have major impact on the school.

#### Science department

When a teacher wants to carry out a practical experiment, they obviously need to be prepared ready for the students to use. The science staff here carry out that process, ensuring all the materials the teacher asked for are present. Sometimes if the students where to handle potentially dangerous chemicals, one of these staff may assist the students to make sure the students are in a safe environment.

#### **Reception staff**

The reception staff play an important role within the school, they have many roles. However, their most important role is checking for student absences and then contacting the parent or guardian for an explanation. They also supply students with information or first aid, if need be. Behind the main reception are other staff who play a very vital role. These include business management, involving how the schools' finances are spent.

#### LRC staff

The LRC staff here at Beths play a much more important role than supervising the LRC during breaks. Their other jobs include arranging substitute teachers for the students that day. Therefore it is essential these staff are always vigilant



because if a class wasn't to have a substitute, they may miss out on important learning. They also handle other extracurricular activates that the students partake in. The best example is the Jack Petchey award where teachers and pupils are nominated to win a special award.

#### **Canteen staff**

The canteen staff here at Beths aren't directly related to the school in any way yet they still play a big part in many students' day. The canteen staff start the day by cooking and preparing large batches of meals to be served. This includes both hot and cold food. Then the staff take rotations on serving the food throughout the school. The school also provides vegan and vegetarian options to students who can't eat foods with certain ingredients.



In response to Russia's invasion of Ukraine, Sweden and Finland confirmed the allegiance to NATO. Previously, Putin had stated that joining would be a "mistake", and so this action has sparked further tension and controversy, as Finland and Sweden begin to act independently.

A Pentagon spokesperson commented on Russia's involvement on the matter of interference with this decision, saying how "Russia shouldn't get to veto what a sovereign state wants to do in terms of its alliances and its associations". The increased tension between Finland and Russia has created stress amongst the young community in Finland, as the long land border creates anxiety for a potential expansion and invasion to the west. They are told to continue life as normal and focus on activities they enjoy and talk about other things to their friends. Since the largest source of their anxiety stems from the news, they are encouraged and told not to look at the news, after school. However, how long can the youngers be desensitised to the war, with more news and video footage of the war eventually being exposed to them? How might this affect their childhood and future opportunities?

In further light, Turkish president Erdogan says the country won't approve of this application for allegiance, with further accusations of harbouring terrorists. Putin mentions that the application and joining of these sovereign states only provoke a response with use of military infrastructure. Moving on to recent news in New York, 10 deaths have been accounted for by the Buffalo gunman, said to be fuelled by his beliefs of white supremacy. Controversy strikes as questions arise as to how the murderer could carry out such a crime, even with alerted and raised concerns. The man, Payton Gendron, was arrested, after he opened fire in the store's car park described as a "rampage". Information has been gathered about the online activity of the extremist, and how he put together his "manifesto" including racist language and ideas. Still to this day racism pervades, as the black community struggle to live safely in the country, without fear of racist attacks.

The mayor of the region states that the community is one of peace and "love", and the shooter extremely driving for hours to "perpetrate this crime on the people of Buffalo," has left the community stunned. The families are left troubled and scarred, and raises further questions about the American gun culture. With 316 people shot every day in America, more than 100 of these people die. Do you think guns should be allowed in America?

I was at this for a good 4-5 hours, unfortunately I was put to a halt when I injured my ankle. This was a major setback, but due to the severity of the

Then came the count. This is where you can physically see the workers count the votes, this amplified the feelings we already had, everyone had worries. There is not much to say about the count, for the next few hours it was just the counting of votes. Labour had workers who observed the votes for the whole time, which I heavily respected, they watched the same motion for 5 hours, ticking and piling papers. We were fortunate to have these workers, the counters made mistakes which we were able to catch out.

It came to the results. Everyone's heart was pumping so hard. It was very late at night, but it was as if it was the middle of the day. Everyone had so much energy within them. Remember earlier where I said I was wrong about us edging it? I was wrong because Labour absolutely blew everyone else out the water. The gap between the several parties and Labour were in the hundreds. Everyone started shouting, clapping and leaping in joy.

It was and will always be a memorable experience to me. I had the opportunity to speak to many of the politicians and gained so much experience. I was overwhelmed the whole day, it truly felt like a fantasy, a dream come true. 
## Beths LGBTQ+ Think Tank

#### What is Ramadan?

Ramadan is the Arabic name for the ninth month in the Islamic calendar. Observing the fast during Ramadan is considered one of the Five Pillars of Islam. Fasting is considered to be an act of worship, which enables Muslims to feel closer to God and strengthen their spirit and self-discipline.

#### How is Ramadan carried out?

## The Benefits of Studying a Diverse Curriculum



Minority authors are nothing but a positive in schools and I believe that they should only be promoted more and more, not less and less in schools. To get a complete experience in English, a diverse curriculum is quintessential. Reading the works of authors from a myriad of backgrounds gives students the chance to see the world through a lens that would usually be inaccessible to them. For example, ZZ Packer's story, Brownies allows pupils to see things like the pitfalls of a toxic friend group and the animosity held for white people from black people – something that's rarely explored. It's an ironic issue as the animosity is birthed from the years of racism black people experience. In the story, this leads to the girls harbouring resentment and inadvertently lashing out on the wrong people – highlighting the fact that 2 wrongs don't make a right. There's also the difficulty of understanding/ replicating the perspective/ experiences of ethnic minority women. Ethnic minority women are arguably the most marginalized group of people on the planet, being judged on the colour of their skin and their gender before their writing ability. For a female dominated industry -60%- a majority of bestsellers -58%- are men.

Whilst there have been many important works about racial divide in the past by white authors – Lee's To Kill A Mockingbird and Steinbeck's Of Mice And Men for example-there's an inescapable limitation to the ability of an author to write from a per-

that's not their own; the most they can do is empathize, the can't experience. White authors in the past that wanted to bring light to the plight of minorities were forced to take matters into their own hands as minorities at the time had little chance to be published. However, we are now in a society where minority authors can actually grasp a foothold in the writing industry, and we can read works about minorities from minorities. It's undoubtable that people with first-hand experiences have a greater capacity to write about these experiences. Because of this, the argument could be made that there is no longer a need for books about racial divide by white authors to be taught in schools anymore. These stories were only necessary when there was no alternative, they paved the way for minority authors but now that its clear, stories by minority authors should be embraced by shorts.

Literature throughout history has galvanized, inspired and educated. Napoleon Bonaparte himself said, 'I fear 3 newspapers more than 1000 bayonettes'. This speaks volumes about the importance of journalism and the way literature can change the world. Information has passed down through books, we learn of ancient civilization history and philosophy through writing in all its forms. Reading the works of someone like ZZ Packer could be the turning point in a little black girl's life. The relatability of the works and just knowing that someone else has experienced what you have can be inspiring and valuable.

The power of literature does not only come in the form of stories but can come in a multitude of ways, like speeches. In year 8 we studied the famous 'I have a dream speech' by Dr Martin Luther King. The speech roused an entire nation and trailblazed the path for equality for black people in America. Reading a speech like this can prove to young minority children that their words can hold weight and it can be encouraging to see people that have risen above the same challenges they face.
