That realisation was the catalyst for me to setup my own blog. It was free, basic and, to be honest, not very good.

But it was a starting point and a place for me to improve as a journalist in my own time, away from the essay writing skills which are demanded by our education system.

Those foundations enabled me to source some work experience placements which are without doubt the most invaluable part of a CV. If you've got relevant experience, even at the most basic level, straight away you go to the top of the pile.

I had the opportunity to work for Sky Sports News at their studio in London, Wisden during the Cricket World Cup and the Olympic Park press office during the athletics World Championships. I also became the lead match reporter for Dartford FC and took over communications for my local cricket club, gaining invaluable skills at an early age.

Even after progressing onto my degree at the University of Sheffield (and during the dreaded Covid) I managed to find ways to do freelance work for regional and local publications. All unpaid but the real value was the experience.

After making a contact at the Daily Mail Sport, I came in for a couple of weeks at different points throughout 2022. They didn't give me masses of work to do, but what they did give me I tried to absolutely nail and prove my ability. I said yes to everything, even when I wasn't sure exactly what to do.

They were happy with my work (I think!) but said there was no opportunity at present. Then, just as I was beginning to panic about finding a job once I graduated this summer, I received a call to say the Mail and Mail on Sunday sports desk would be interested in me working for them. My job role is incredibly fluid and I get to do a bit of everything - a fantastic grounding and at a national newspaper too.

I'm now a few months of late night finishes down the line and feel incredibly fortunate to be doing a job I love day in, day out. I know there's still a long way to go for me in my career and I have promised myself to work just as hard to get there as I did to this point.

But I hope it just goes to show how, alongside an incredible education you will get at a great school like Beths or a degree from a top university like Sheffield, it can be what you do away from the classroom that can make all the difference. Pursuing an interest outside of classroom hours doesn't have to feel like a chore either - as the old saying goes, once you find something you'll love, you'll never work a day in your life.

In English, I was unable to take part or ask for help and felt quite isolated not being able to engage in class. In Mandarin, I found it challenging to try find the vocabulary to fully articulate what my answer was without using English to do so. I was considerably saddened by the fact that I was unable to participate as I have, and still, always enjoyed these subjects. In PE, I found myself confused at what to do and felt as if a zip was drawn across my mouth as I desperately wanted to speak English in order to ask for help.

Another difficult aspect of the challenge was having to get a teacher to sign a slip confirming that you did not speak any English. During break and lunch, I found it hard to: a) find a teacher and b) articulate that I wanted them to sign. 


The list of outstanding achievements go on, but those reasons are some of the ones that personally really stood out for the Beth's awards. Congratulations everyone!

Love Island: Pleasant or Poison

In a workshop with Henry Clarke,, news reporters were given the challenge of writing an article in 25 minutes. Of the two topics, I chose "watching reality tv is a waste of time".

A study by Mental Health Foundation finds that 24% of young people say that reality TV shows cause them body image issues. Shows like 'Love Island' and the 'Jeremy Kyle Show' have sprung to popularity in the news sensational age of technology, as they feed off both people desires *and* insecurities.

For example, if you haven't seem it already on adverts or social media, Love Island is a reality TV show in which a group of attractive men and women participate in a series of sultry and scandalous tasks with a partner hey keep flippantly changing until they find the love of their life. CBS praises the show as "the sizzling summer series based on the international smash hit and cultural phenomenon" whilst in reality, it is far from beneficial to viewers.

Superficial shows like this have caused more than 15% of young adults to self-harm due to concerns about body image. Dr Antonis Kousoulis from the Mental Health Foundation argues that programmes like these are "not diverse, [are] largely unrealistic and [are] presented as aspirational".

In an interview, ITV's Richard Cowles told the guardian "clearly the contestants are extremely attractive... but we're not saying the whole world looks like that... It's an aspirational show".

As consumers of media, it must be considered how trendy shows like Love Island, the Kardashians, TOWIE etc. are affecting our youth. These shallow spectacles are ironically named reality shows, when they demonstrate ideals far from this. What will you choose to watch in the future?

The British Junior Rowing Championships by Jayden 10H

The British Junior Rowing Championships (or as rowers have affectionately dubbed it, Brit Champs) took place from the 15th of July to the 17th of July at the Holme Pierrepont, the national water sports centre in Nottingham. Along with the National Schools Regatta, it's the biggest junior rowing competition in the UK, taking place on a national scale. The top clubs and schools from around the country, and even schools representative of other countries, compete to become the top crew in their age category. Many that dare to enter have up to half a decade of experience in the boat, whether it be sculling or sweeping, and incredible technique to back it up.

For these reasons, I was, therefore, shocked and completely thrown off guard to hear that my coach had made the decision to enter me and my doubles partner into the competition. At the time of the competition, I had only been part of what's called the performance squad (a group of juniors that train up to 4 times a week and represent the club at numerous competitions) for just shy of six months. Furthermore, my training hadn't been particularly consistent, as during that six-month time period, I'd switched between multiple different boats: first a coxed quad, then a single, and finally the double we'd been entered in. That isn't to say I wasn't ecstatic for the opportunity to represent my club and prove to my coaches, family, and self, that all that hard work wasn't a waste – but our double hadn't been particularly successful. Until that point, my partner and I had had limited success, only winning gold in the Cambridge Head-to-Head race.

Upon hearing this news, it dawned on me and my doubles partner that the training for this regatta would be more arduous than any other we'd competed in before it. In the two weeks leading up to Brit Champs, we went out in the boat every single training session we could, with a range of focuses for each one. For some sessions, the focus was purely technical, meaning that our aim was to improve and refine our technique. For others, the focus was on speed; we'd practice sculling 1000m as fast as possible, which not only prepared us for the rate at which we'd need to be stroking the boat, but also

gave us a checkpoint, from which we could compare ourselves to the times of the previous year's J15s (year 10s), and determine where we could eliminate those couple seconds between us and the time we'd need to be comfortable and confident in getting gold.

We journeyed the three hours to Nottingham by car, the day before the competition. Upon arrival, we checked into our hotel and settled into our rooms. Ensuring our alarms were set for 06:00 the next day, we fell asleep, and dreamed of a perfect race and a gold medal. On the day of racing, we arrived at Holme Pierrepont at 8:00. This gave us plenty of time to rig the boat and warm up before our time trial, which was scheduled to start at 11:05. While it's common to dismiss time trials as unimportant and boring, they are arguably the most important part of the regatta. The time a crew achieves in the time trial determines the final they're allocated to (top crews go to the A final) as well as the lane they receive (top crews get the middle most lanes.) My doubles partner and I came 6th out of 34 crews in the time trials, and so we scraped our way into the A finals, at the cost of receiving a good lane.

Our final was at 16:45, and we ended up coming sixth. While, obviously, it's never a particularly great feeling when you miss out on the opportunity to go home with a medal around your neck, the coaches were proud of us, and most importantly, we were proud of ourselves for our resilience and determination. Bearing in mind the fact that we were relatively inexperienced and amateur in comparison to all the other crews in that A final, the fact that we even managed to get into it was an achievement in and of itself. However, we shall continue to train hard in the hopes of returning to Brit Champs next year and annihilating the crews that rowed through us this year.

Playoffs/Finals

The Golden State Warriors earned their 7th championship in the 2021-2022 NBA season after beating the Boston Celtics 4 games to 2. This win proved very special to several different players. Steph Curry earned his 4th ring this year while 28th pick in the 2019 NBA draft Jordan Poole won his first. This series taught a lot of basketball fans different things. Firstly, Steph Curry is rising up the legacy table. Recently inducted in the NBA 75, Curry has been proving he deserves a table with the greats. With critics labelling him as the greatest point guard of all time (being argued with Magic Johnson). His game last season was dry, inefficient and regular; however, he came back this season with a mindset to win. And he won big. Winning the all-star MVP and the NBA finals MVP. He also averaged 27.4 points with the second most total points this season and most 3 pointers made. The NBA finals also taught us that Jayson Tatum is not ready to be labelled as a superstar. Tatum has fallen short, but it is important to remember that he is only 24 and his first season in an all-NBA first team. Draft Day

A lot of people don't know how the NBA draft works. In this article, I will be going through what the NBA draft is and how it works in a quick summary. Firstly, NBA teams take part in the draft lottery. The NBA Draft Lottery is used to determine the order of the first 14 picks in the draft. The 14 teams that did not make the playoffs the previous season are given a chance at the number one overall pick. Each team is assigned number combinations involving four digits. The lottery begins by randomly shuffling 14 balls numbered until four balls are drawn. The team with the corresponding fourdigit number combination will receive the first pick in the upcoming draft. This process takes place three more times until the top four draft picks are assigned to teams. The ten remaining teams that did not make the playoffs draft selections are allocated based on the team's record from the previous regular season from worst to best. After the top 14 draft picks are assigned to the NBA teams that did not make the playoffs the previous season, the remaining picks for the first and second round (picks 15-60) are assigned. Like picks 5-14 in the first round, the remaining selections in the first round are allocated to teams in inverse order based on their previous regularseason record. This ensures that each team receives one pick in the first round. The second round of the draft utilizes the same format, where each team is awarded one selection, and the picks are given out in reverse order based on regular-season records. NBA teams are allowed to trade their draft picks and frequently do so. Then the prospects go through a test called the NBA combine. They try their best to impress the potential suitors by showcasing their talent, going through several physical tests, and of course by playing basketball as best as possible. Then comes the big night It is the time when sixty players are chosen by the franchises, thirty in the first round, and thirty in the second round. In the first round, the franchises are given five minutes to make their picks, or to formulate a deal with another franchise in need of their pick. The 2022 NBA First pick draft Paolo Banchero got selected by the Orlando magic which was an exciting pick to see.

A new season means a new video game for most major sport. Basketball is no different. The official release of NBA2K23 will be on September 9th, 2022. Pricing depends on edition. The Michael Jordan Edition will be launched at £99.99, the Championship Edition will be available at £149.99 and last but not least, the Standard Edition will cost \$59.99; it will be launched on PS4, Xbox One, Switch, PC, and Nintendo Switch, and £69.99 on PS5, Xbox Series X|S. Each edition comes with different in game rewards for players to use and upgrade their teams. Rewards such as 5,000 Virtual Currency, 5,000 MyTEAM Points, 10 MyTEAM Promo Packs (delivered once a week), A Boost for each MyCAREER Skill type, A Boost for each Gatorade Boost type, Devin Booker MyPLAYER Jersey, 95 Rated Devin Booker MyTEAM Free Agent Card come included in the champion-ship edition.

On the week commencing the 14th of March, I was fortunate enough to be invited to Corpus Christi College, Oxford for the law residential scheme which they only offer to 30 students per year. Like with all things Oxford, the selection process was rigorous as we had to submit an essay that was to be considered by some of the top legal minds in the country and after weeks of waiting, I was delighted to be informed that I had been commended with a place on the programme. It was only once I arrived that I understood just how fierce the competition for a place had been because the outreach officer at Corpus informed us all that more people had applied for fewer places than those that had applied for the actual law course offered at Oxford and to put that into perspective last year jurisprudence at Oxford received 1899 applicants for around 232 undergraduate degrees! Upon arrival, we were taken through Corpus' beautiful old quad to the "MBI Al Jaber Building", a strikingly modern auditorium where I met my fellow prospective law students who were all incredibly friendly.

Not long after the initial "pleased to meet yous" had been uttered, we were ushered into the conference room where we began our first law workshop of the 2-day residential: "Feral Wrong-doers" with Professor Matt Dyson. During this incredibly insightful session, conducted by perhaps the most imposingly intelligent individual which I have ever met, we discussed the law's definition of pets as property and the extent to which their owner is responsible for damages that they can cause. To illustrate the concept of tort law Professor Dyson asked us to determine the potential outcome of a case involving 3 stampeding horses under the "Animals Act 1971", he made the point of telling me specifically that a good lawyer must cite the specific wording of legislation verbatim in order for the meaning and authority of the act to be maintained.

Overall, I am incredibly grateful to Beths for allowing me to undergo this week of legal work experience as it has been a great opportunity to grasp what studying and practising the law will entail as these experiences have only increased my interest in the career path.
