It is very important to Beths that our young people are feeling well. There are things we can all do to help ourselves to stay well. We are passionate about encouraging these messages around school and Wellbeing week provided an excellent opportunity to get our young people thinking about how they are feeling.

What is feeling 'well'?

Wellbeing and good mental health are being able to feel, express and manage a range of positive and negative emotions.
It is realistic to acknowledge that we may not feel 100% happy at all times, but it is essential to know what we can do to help ourselves. Being well contributes to our overall health, because being emotionally and physically healthy feels good!

What did we do?

The Wellbeing team at Beths are committed to promoting emotional selfawareness and Wellbeing Week provided lots of opportunities for this.

The Stress Bucket - students were asked to consider the areas in their lives that may be causing them stress and the ways they may reduce that stress.

Favourite Memory – KS3 students were asked to write or draw their favourite memory – research has identified that recalling positive memories and experiences during adolescence may help resilience in teens and reduce the risk of depression in later life.

Resilience Planning – being resilient means we are better able to adapt to and

Barcelona Football Tour November 2019

In the early hours of Thursday 31st October, a group of Year 8 and 10 set off for Stansted Airport. They were about to embark on their incredible footballing journey for the next four days, playing in the World Schools Football Cup. When they arrived at Barcelona airport, they immediately set off for the Camp Nou, the prestigious stadium of Barcelona Football Club.

During the tour, the commentator's box, the dugouts and the press room were all open to view, as well as some amazing historical objects, like shirts worn by famous players and a countless number of trophies won. After a few hours at the biggest stadium in Europe, everyone had to endure two hours on the coach back to the chosen resort - Cambrils Park Resort.

The following day, the first matches were played with the U15's winning three out of three, the U13's team one, winning four out of four and the U13's team two, winning three out of four (drawing one). All in all, a very successful day.

On Saturday, the most important games took place. For both of the U13's teams, there was one more group stage game to play, with unfortunate losses in the two matches. However, this did not matter, as both teams had already been guaranteed a place in the next round, where both teams would play each other. This was good, as it meant one team was definitely in the final. On the other hand, it was bad, as it meant that both teams were not able to reach the final.

The game took place later on in the day, ending in a result of 4-2, with David adding three to his collection of goals over the tournament, securing his team's place in the final. Beths U13's team one would play Ovingham School in the U13'S final. Meanwhile, in the U15's semifinals, Beths had triumphed over a school all the way from Dubai. This meant that they had reached the final, and were playing Douglas Academy from Scotland!

The Beths U13's team one were the first out of the two Beths teams to play in the final. Despite all of their efforts, the team could not defeat Ovingham, losing 2-0, but still earning themselves a silver medal. However, one trophy was brought back to the school, with the U15's team triumphing over Douglas Academy 1-0.

Not only did they win the trophy, but they were also the only team to not concede a single goal.

After all of the finals were concluded, the awards ceremony commenced, where each team was giving a participation medal, or a gold, silver or bronze medal if they came first second or third. The U13's were the first to collect their medals, with a silver medal for team one and team two narrowly missing out on a bronze, coming fourth.

As well as this, David in 8w won the golden boot of the U13's category, due to his eleven goals in seven games. Next to step up to the podium were the Under 15's, who received a large trophy in recognition of their victory.

The Story of Guy Fawkes

Guy Fawkes was part of the Gunpowder plot in 1605. He wanted to blow up the Houses of

- Parliament, primarily because of religious beliefs. England was a Protestant country and
- the plotters were Catholic. They wanted England to be Catholic again, which they thought they could do if they killed King James I and his ministers.
- Fawkes and his group put 36 barrels of gunpowder in cellars underneath the Houses of
- Parliament in London, ready to set off a massive explosion. However, one member of
- Fawkes' group, sent a letter to his brother-in-law, Lord Monteagle, who worked in Parliament, warning him to stay away on 5th November. The King's supporters got hold of the letter and the plot was ruined.
- Guy was tortured, his guards cut open his chest while he was still alive and cooked his organs! If that wasn't enough already, Guy Fawkes was then cut up into small pieces which were burnt, and his head was put on a pike outside of The Houses of Parliament.

News in Science and Technology

'Hyper-realistic' masks have recently been surfacing around Japan at only a cost of around £1,000. Researchers say that these "masks are so convincing that people can't distinguish them from a real face".

This can be seen when a sum of 240 people in both the UK and Japan were tested to distinguish which photos



showed a face and which showed masks and in a fifth of these scenarios, they were fooled.

Dr Jet Sanders says, "Failure to detect synthetic faces may have important implications for security and crime prevention as hyper-realistic masks may allow the key characteristics of a person's appearance to be incorrectly identified"

There are concerns that with time, these masks will gain more popularity and prices will become more affordable, possible causing crime numbers to sky-rocket.

The theme of this conference was to learn what it meant to be a man. To be a man is what you think on the inside, nobody can tell you what it means to be a man apart from yourself!


