Year 10 – Health & Safety in the Work Place


On Wednesday 18 April the Rah Rah Theatre Company came into school during Periods 3 and 4 to prepare Year 10 students for their up and coming Work Experience and the 'World of Work'. All students, prior to going on Work Experience, must by Law be aware of Health & Safety in the work place.

The production comprised of a 'game show' with two teams competing against each other. The show had five rounds each highlighting one area of work experience and points were awarded at the end of each round. The areas covered were as follows:

Interview Techniques: preparation for an interview including initial telephone conversations with prospective employers.

Employer's Expectations: allows students to gain some insight into what employers expect of students during their work experience placement.

Dress to Impress: helps students decide what to wear during their placement including appropriate dress, health and safety, and hygiene.



Customer Service: allows the students to identify good and

bad customer service which helps them during their work experience placement.

Health and Safety: demonstrates what students need to know about Health and Safety in the work place.

What we've been up to this week

Well, there has been plenty of things going on. On Tuesday, Imperial College came into school to talk to the Year 12 students about how to write their Personal Statements – giving them pointers as to what sort of things universities are looking for when reading through the hundreds of personal statements they receive every year.

Over half of our Year 10 students visited Sussex University on Wednesday. This was a visit to give them a taster of what to expect if they chose to go to university. Students were able to attend lectures, see the sort of accommodation and entertainment that would be available to them and also meet current students to get a true indication of what life at Uni is all about.

On Thursday, all our Year 8 students sat the Junior Maths Challenge over the course of the day. This was sat in true 'examination style' in total silence and with invigilators present, which also prepares students for when they will sit their GCSE and A Level exams in the years to come.

Students on Site
