Tuesday marked European Day of Languages, and since our focus this year was on Greek, the catering team served up a tantalizing spread of Greek delicacies for lunch, including moussaka, spanakopita, and orzo. Meanwhile, our Year 8 students had the opportunity to embark on a culinary adventure of their own. After winning a ticket in their language lessons, they were invited to enjoy food tasting sessions featuring French, Spanish, Italian, German, or Chinese cuisine, from an array of cheeses and cured meats to the delights of bubble tea.

In the midst of these culinary experiences on Tuesday, Ms Blyghton also hosted a GCHQ webinar in the school hall, where a range of guest speakers from the UK's largest intelligence agency explained how languages helped them advance in their careers.


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MAYPLACE PRIMARY FRENCH OUTREACH






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YEAR 8 SCIENCE LESSONS

STUDENT SUCCESS

Following a weekend of <u>British Taekwondo National Poomsae</u> <u>Championships 2023</u> - Gabriel had the opportunity to compete against some of the best Taekwondo Poomsae players across the UK, managing to take home a total tally of 4 medals, with 2 Gold, 1 Silver and 1 Bronze.

We are extremely proud of Gabriel's outstanding achievement placing 3rd (Bronze) overall nationally for his Individual Under 14 DAN, Male Black Belt category which saw him compete against 21 other incredible players in the finals.

Additional accomplishments from the national championships saw Gabriel become a National Champion for the Team Under 14 DAN, Male Black Belt category which saw his team winning Gold in the finals against 3 other outstanding teams from other clubs.

Gabriel also became a National Champion for the Family Team DAN, Male Black Belt category which saw he and his Family win Gold against 4 other exceptional families in the finals.













STUDENT SUCCESS

The final addition to Gabriel's medal tally came in the form of a Silver medal where he teamed up with a female black belt from another club to compete in the Pair Under 14, Male/Female Black Belt category, competing against 12 other outstanding pairs, some of whom were also members of the GBR National Squad.

Gabriel continues to inspire his peers from Win Taekwondo Academy, proving that great things come from hard work and perseverance.

The next major championship event for Gabriel is the European Poomsae Taekwondo Championship, due to take place at Olympiaworld, Olympiastraße 10, Innsbruck 6020 Austria between Friday 24th and Sunday 26th November. A team of 47 athletes, coaches and support team members from 24 British Taekwondo clubs will be represented in the 2023 European Poomsae Taekwondo Championships and European Para Taekwondo Championship.

On Friday 13th October our Year 8 and Year 10 football teams set off to Barcelona to take part in the World Schools Football Cup 2023!



Following an early flight from Gatwick, the teams arrived at Cambrils Park Resort Salou excited for the first set of matches kicking off at 4.30pm. Mr G.S led the Year 8 Team 1 out against GEMS Wellington from Dubai which finished 3-3, whilst Mr Webb's Year 10 side got their first win of the tournament with a convincing 3-0 win v Asia Pacific Schools from Malaysia.

All 30 students then headed straight to the opening ceremony, where the schools from all over the world were introduced – England, Spain, Nigeria, Dubai, Kazakhstan, Brazil, Uganda and many more. This was a fantastic event, which really set the tone for the rest of the competition with plenty of excitement in the air!

On Saturday the Year 8 Team 2 got their campaign underway, beating Morna College Ibiza 5-0 – a very promising start under the guidance of Mr Waite! All 3 teams continued with their group games throughout the day, playing some excellent football and showing great tenacity and Beths scholar values, on and off the pitch. As the day drew to a close, the group stage placings were confirmed with the both of the Year 8's finishing 3rd in their respective groups, meaning they would now enter the Plate Competition on Sunday. The Year 10's maintained their perfect start with 6 wins out of 6, placing top of the group! They now faced Cambridge School Bucharest in the semi final on Sunday.









Despite some tiredness following a busy Saturday, the teams made their way to the sports ground full of excitement and a determination to win their final matches and come away with some silverware for Beths. Year 8 Team 1 were up against Millfield School from England, which was a close contest however with some clinical finishing, Millfield won 2-0 and progressed into the next round. Finally with a 5-1 win v Churchill Community College, Year 8 Team 1 finished their tournament in 5th place in the Plate.

Year 8 Team 2 were up against Arcadia School Dubai which they won 3-1 with an outstanding hat-trick from Noah C. Confidence was high as they prepared for their semi-final v Churchill Community College (2). However, despite their best efforts they were beaten 3-0 against a good side. In their 3rd and 4th play-off and final match against Ovingham School England the team were evidently tired after a strenuous 2 days, and were beaten 6-1. Both the Year 8 teams did exceptionally well, with some great performances.







As the Year 10 side warmed up for their semi-final v Cambridge School Bucharest, they knew it was going to be a difficult match having watched them in the previous round. Beths started quickly, with some early chances from Raynon and Bradley, but unfortunately they could not score. Finally, with a good ball over the top from Harvey, Nathaniel was able to break through and finish the ball into the bottom corner. With 10 minutes left, Beths continued to dominate the game and secure the win, keeping a well-earned clean sheet.

The final was v GEMS Wellington (Dubai), and as the two sides walked out to the Champions League theme song the players and spectators knew this was going to be an exciting match. Beths again started quickly and began to dominate. A long-range effort from Daniel forced the goalkeeper to make a save, which is followed in and finished by Bradley to give Beths the lead- a great start, but still a lot to do! The rest of the match was relatively even, with half chances at both ends, but with some excellent defending from David and Owen, Beths were able to see it over the line and see themselves crowned World Schools Football Cup Champions! A fantastic achievement to win the tournament, scoring 24 goals and remaining undefeated!

The trip was finished off with an enjoyable visit to the Nou Camp before heading home with the trophy. Overall it was a brilliant tour and a great experience for all involved. Well done to all of the players – you have done us all proud!

Reviewing the iPhone 15

On September the 22^{nd} , Apple released their latest batch of iPhones, the 15 series. There have been many major changes differentiating the 15s from the 14s, such as the new addition of USB 3 on the pro models, and USB 2 on the non-pro models. This was due to a new European regulation which was



meant to reduce landfill waste. The change does mean you can carry one USB cable to charge all your apple products, however it now means any lightning ported gadgets made specifically for iPhones are now useless. There is also a cool new action button which is in the position

of the traditional ring/silent slider we've seen since the iPhone 2G. Not only does it do the same functions as the ring/slider, but it also allows us to quickly launch an app or do a specific task, custom to whatever we programme it to do. All iPhones have a larger battery and all come with dynamic island and are all lighter than their predecessors. However, only the Pro models come with titanium sides. The titanium helps with the lightness and durability of the phone, but it is only 1mm thick and it only wraps around the phone, so you still get standard aluminium on the back. They have also supposedly made iPhones easier to fix, something that people have been waiting ages for. This is because you can open it from the front, back and you can easily access the internals of the phone.

As for photography, all phones come with a 48 megapixel main lens, the nonstandard ones having a t/1.6 aperture and a 26mm focal length. Furthermore, they can now digitally zoom in twice and get a clean 12 megapixel shot as the resolution has been quadrupled from last gen. The Pro Maxes have a t/1.78 aperture, however they have implemented a new technology into the main cameras which means it can have a 24, 28 and 35mm focal length points. The Pro Max model also has a telephoto lens which can do up to 6x optical zoom.

Bristol Bus Boycott



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In 1963, a young black man named Guy Bailey was refused an interview for a job at the Bristol Omnibus Company because of the colour of skin. This sparked a boycott of the company's buses, led by youth worker Paul Stephenson and the West Indian Development Council. Eventually, this boycott attracted national attention and ultimately paved the way to the country's

first ever race discrimination law, the Race Relations Act, five years later. This act



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Following on from their popularity at the Careers Fair last July, The Engineering and Design Institute London invited some of our 6th form students to a tour of their facilities and campus in Canada Water followed by an Engineering activity.



Year 11 Work Experience

Work experience for our year 11 students is a great opportunity to try out an area of work within a career the students may want to pursue. For some, at the end of the week the work experience will have reinforced their career aspirations. For others, the experience could discount that career path, which can be equally as useful. For the majority of students though, it is more than that. It is also an opportunity to develop transferrable skills that will benefit the students in their future careers, whichever path they decide to take.











190 students attended in-person work experience placement during the designated work experience week of 9-13 October. 140 of these students found their placements themselves, which is an experience and an achievement for the students in itself – particularly those who had to interview for the position. The remaining 50 students were placed in school found placements, using existing and new contacts. Where

possible, these students were placed by career interest and location by the Careers Team. In total, 165 separate employers hosted our students during the designated work experience week. We are very grateful to these employers who gave their time and resources in providing such a valuable experience to our students.

It's been great to receive positive feedback from employers regarding our students:

- Both A and J were a pleasure to have in our school. They were mature, sensible, helpful, polite and respectful. They were great in their work with the children too. They are a credit to your school.

- Excellent student with a great attitude to learning.

- F showed his capacity for creation when he suggested a number of design variations on the landscape design of one our schemes.

- - His keenness to understand why we do things a particular way really stood out.

- To walk into a completely new environment on a Monday morning is a tough ask, but he managed this well. He is genuinely kind young man, who should be very proud of what he achieved last week.

- A was very inquisitive when speaking with various people across the business, and really sought to gain as much information about a number of topics which he had not previously had experienced of.

- S spent time in the office and took part in team discussions about the work of a Solicitor. He actively engaged in a meaningful discussion and gave his own opinion on topics being discussed.

-His quick adaptation to the project management structure and his active involvement in various departments every day are commendable.







Students were asked to describe one thing that they learnt through doing the placement:

- I learnt that work is far more independent compared to school which can be a good thing at times because it forces you to solve your own problems which develops your problem solving skills.

- The most important thing I learned during my placement is the value of cohesion.

- Working under some project managers, business analysists and testers, I learned and developed a wide range of skills and knowledge to effectively plan, execute and oversee projects; I learned multiple project management methodologies such as "Waterfall" and "Agile" and others.

We also asked students How doing the placement impacted on your plans for the future

- I am now considering a career in teaching more seriously. The placement helped me realise what it is like to work with young children on a daily basis, and this is something that I would be interested in pursuing in the future.

- I really enjoyed it there and am maybe considering an apprenticeship in the future.

- Helped give me an idea of a 9-5 job and given me a wider range of jobs to consider.

- Seeing the smiles of children and watching them gain knowledge, seeing their excitement to share their hobbies like gymnastics, has enforced my decision to inspire children and aim to further their ambitions.

- I believe the transfer of skills from one work environment to my next one will be greatly beneficial.

- I am more informed of the work that a lawyer does and I better understand what is expected of me.

- I have a good relationship with accountancy and I now feel like I am interested in this course/career. I also want to work for them again in the summer, as I have had a really good time.

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


