Ref: Year 13 Trial Exams

Monday 29 January – Friday 9 February 2024 is the Trial Exam period for Year 13 students and attached is the timetable and the topic to revise list.

The purpose of this week is not only to prepare them for the feel of what to expect in the actual exams, but also to give subject teachers an opportunity to make an assessment of what your young person is capable of achieving under exam conditions.

I would ask that you kindly assist us in preparing your young person for these exams. Students will be on Study Leave for the duration of these exams; they are expected to be on the Hard courts 15 mins before the start of each exam.

Session 1 – 09.00am Session 3 -13.00pm

Exam Procedure for Students:

Please be advised of the following procedures which all students must follow;

- Arrive on time and fully prepared with the correct equipment pens, pencils, ruler, eraser, and calculator (where required).
- > Ensure all equipment is stored in a clear pencil case or plastic bag.
- Students must not take into the main hall any unauthorised materials or equipment which might give them an unfair advantage such as notes, calculator cases/instruction leaflets, bags, mobile phones/tablets/ MP3 players/smart watches.
- Students may have a clear water bottle with a 'sports top', to prevent any spillages, (labels must be removed from the bottle).
- All students must be punctual for these assessments. This means being outside the Sports Hall at least 15 minutes before the start of the exams.
- Students must deposit their bags in either S0 or Hut 3 classrooms before waiting outside the Sports Hall (Science block end)
- > If students would like to revise between an AM and PM exam they must go to the LRC
- > Upon entering the main hall students will be under exam conditions and must be complete silence at all times.
- > Once in the main hall students must find their desk and take a seat at that desk.
- > All exams must be written in **black ink**.
- No correction fluid or pen erasers should be used; if you make a mistake, cross it out with a single line and start again.
- > <u>All students should be wearing full school uniform.</u>

Please be advised that the school will not be handing out any stationery. Therefore, it is essential that all students come prepared.
