


Up and Coming Events

"The Blue Kite" Review by Anson Chow – Anson has been studying the film as part of his Pre-U Mandarin

The Blue Kite is a Chinese film, directed by Tian Zhuangzhuang, in 1993, that is set in the 1950s to 1960s, when China was undergoing three different movements to make the country fully communist: the Anti-Rightist movement, The Great Leap Forward and Cultural Revolution. The film shows the life of Tietou, a young Chinese boy who develops into a naughty, mischievous teenager from being a cheerful youth, due to unfortunate events throughout the early years of his life. Tietou and his family can be seen as a representation of Chinese people in how they experience the effects on their development of different movements on his once-normal lifestyle.

The Blue Kite was a film that was banned before its release in China and Tian Zhuangzhuang was banned for two years from filmmaking, due to the release of this film and led to an almost 10-year hiatus from directing. However, the film won top prize at the Tokyo International Film Festival in 1993. China was careful about films based on the Cultural Revolution as they feared that it may show a

negative side to the Chinese Communist Party and may lead to erosion of the legitimacy of the CCP Government.

In the story of The Blue Kite, it is very clear that the titular kite was a major theme throughout the film. The blue kite could be seen as ordinary Chinese families (the kite itself) being tied to the Party's rules (the string that is being held onto by the person in control) and is



unable to set itself free. The colour blue could be interpreted as a sad, cold colour, which is what the Party's activities is making the families feel. Tietou and his mother also experienced numerous "blue" moments throughout the whole film, such as the death of relatives.

Although the start of the film develops slowly, it eventually builds up a lot of tension and the characters change drastically, which allows the viewers to sympathise with The Blue Kite's sentimental story. An example of the development of characters is when Tietou progresses into a colder person, where he eventually blocks off new people that are entering his life, due to the influence of the movements on his life. This is effective as it portrays an idea to the audience that the movement was so influential on people's ordinary lives that it could change the personality of people.

This film has exceeded my expectations and impacted me with a range of emotions, such as the segments of the film where Tietou's fatherly figures all died due to the different movements. This film may be biased due to it portraying mainly the negative perspectives of the three big movements, but I believe that he purposely did this to show how he felt in his point of view, as he grew up during the Cultural Revolution and lost both of his persecuted parents. Overall, the film was extremely enjoyable, in the sense that I was able to learn a lot about Chinese history and also was able to feel what the Chinese citizens felt through the actors and the story itself. The Blue Kite showed the lifestyle of Chinese citizens in the 1950's very accurately. The actors displayed various skills and I would certainly recommend this film to people who have an interest in Chinese history and culture to watch it.
