The English Baccalaureate (EBacc)

The EBacc refers to a combination of subjects that **the Government thinks is important for young people to study at GCSE**.

It includes:

- English Language and Literature
- Mathematics
- 2 Sciences
- Geography or History
- A Modern or Ancient Language

A study by the Sutton Trust reveals that studying the EBacc can help improve a young person's performance in English and Mathematics.

Research by the UCL Institute of Education shows that taking the EBacc enhances prospects for entering further education or employment.

The Decision Making process So where do you start?

- Consider your future career aspirations
- Consider your A Level thoughts (Check the sixth form website for requirements)
- Look at university websites, do they have specific GCSE requirements?
- You may not know exactly what job you want after education, but you may want to consider the type of industry you wish to go into.
- Aim for a 'broad and balanced' range of subjects









Choose subjects that you ENJOY and that you are good at (look at your reports)	Do not let friends influence your decision – this is your future.
Ensure that the chosen subjects will hold your interest for 2 full years	Do not select subjects based on which teacher you think you will have
Read the assessment guidance on the options booklet – will you sit 100% written exams or are there controlled assessments?	There is no such thing as an 'easy GCSE'.
Think about your current skills and consider if you think they are enough for the subject (e.g. Art, Drama, PE)	Do not opt for more than one creative subject, unless agreed with the Head of Subject.
Research careers, university courses etc. and speak to your teachers	

Frequently asked questions

Can my child do more than 10 GCSEs?

We only timetable for students to complete 10 however some students do complete additional GCSEs (often community languages) externally.

We also very strongly discourage students from sitting GCSEs early externally as these rarely result in the grade the student would have got in Year 11.

What GCSEs should my child pick if they want to do X at University?

In short this depends on the course and the university. Look at the A level requirements for courses and work back from there.

Is there any preference over which students get which subjects?

We will aim to give all students their first 4 choices provided the option choices are submitted by the deadline (3pm on the 3rd May).

We rarely need to use students' reserve choices, but it can happen, so please think carefully about that.

Submitting the form early doesn't change your chance of getting on that course.

Will my child do well in subject X? Will they have a certain teacher?

The skills needed for each subject are varied and the best person to speak to is the class teacher or Head of Department.

With regards to staffing we will not be assigning staff to classes until later in the year and staffing may change. This should therefore **NOT** be a factor when selecting subjects.

Can my child do multiple creative subjects?

Our aim at Beths is to produce a curriculum and experience that suits what your child enjoys and excels at. The short answer is therefore yes.

We would, however, caution that the creative arts require a huge time commitment and therefore doing multiple subjects could be somewhat exhausting.

How much homework will my child get?

This varies from subject to subject somewhat.

Up to about 90 minutes per night.

Each subject sets homework once (maybe twice) a week.

Will my child complete coursework?

Increasingly fewer subjects have a coursework component however there are still some.

This can account for up to 60% of the course.

Please look at the options booklet for course-bycourse information.

My child does the MEP – how does this work for GCSEs?

With the MEP, students are on an accelerated pathway for Mandarin. As a result, we attempt to have them in a specific class for GCSE. This is effectively a 'top set'.

Students who choose Mandarin but are not on the MEP are usually put in a group together to provide better support. These students also achieve exceptionally well.

How do you support students with specific SEND needs?

The staff at Beths always want to make sure we make the best decisions for our young people. In some cases, this means tailoring a curriculum to be more suitable for students with SEND. Please contact Mrs Blewett (K.BLEWETT@beths.bexley.sch.uk) directly to

Can you take more than 3 A levels (apart from those doing Further Maths)?

We do allow students to do 4 A levels outside of Further Maths (where they must do 2 additional A levels). However, we reserve this for students who attain top GCSE grades, usually well over an 8 average.

Very few universities offer based on 4 A levels so having 3 top grades is better than 4 good ones.

Is it possible to switch a subject if the student sees it is not for them?

We would certainly try, where possible, to accommodate last minute changes within the first couple of weeks.

Please do bear in mind that classes may have already been filled, so we cannot guarantee there will be space in the requested subject area, but we will endeavour to do our best.

Are Humanities compulsory or optional? Can students study both?

Students are advised to study a humanity, although it is not compulsory.

Students can study both Geography and History should they wish.

Is RE compulsory?

RE is not compulsory. Much of the cultural and ethical content is covered within our PSHCE curriculum.

How many students do you need per subject to make it a viable course?

This is a difficult question to put a fixed number to and depends on several factors, however it is highly unlikely that a GCSE course would be considered on less than double figures.

Are there any restrictions to choices of A Level subjects if they have not been studied to GCSE Level?
