## Beths Politics, Philosophy and Economics Society visit the Houses of Parliament

Upon arrival, on Tuesday 19 June we were welcomed with a warm greeting by Lord Robert Hayward which led to the start of our much-anticipated tour. Lord Hayward is currently a British Conservative Party politician, the only politician to have been appointed an Office of the Order of the British Empire (OBE) for his services outside of politics.

Gratefully, we had the privilege to start our tour through an exclusive entrance which is only accessible to Lords. Through the entrance, we were then guided to the cloak room. It was explained that although there are 800 members of the Chamber, only those with higher credentials were given access to a space to leave their belongings. Subsequently, we were led to the Royal Gallery, a massive room filled with paintings and portraits of monarchs. This room is solely used for important events including state receptions and



parliamentary ceremonies with members of both Houses present. Afterwards, we were directed to the House of Lords chamber, where Lord Hayward works. Within the House of Lords chamber, we were shown to the various benches; front bench, back bench and crossbench, which was allocated depending on the different roles of those who sat on them. Within the House of Lords chamber, there is also an extremely decorative golden throne in which the Queen sits annually to give her state opening of Parliament. Consequently, we were guided to the House of Commons where we were informed of the reason behind the different colours covering the separate chambers within the

Houses of Parliament. Whilst everything in the House of Lords is red, the House of Commons is green. The reason behind this was that when the Parliament was first formed, red was a much more expensive dye and so signified the wealth of royalty.

Lord Hayword received an unexpected call, from a familiar voice in British Politics, James Brokenshire, MP for Bexley and a Conservative Party politician serving as Secretary of State for Housing. To our surprise, the MP had generously allocated time from his busy schedule to meet with us to discuss the workings of British Politics. Arriving in his personal office, where each minister receives their own, we were given an introduction to his role in parliament. This was followed by a Q&A where we took the opportunity to ask questions about



immigration policies after Brexit as well as the MP's personal view on Margaret Thatcher and her role within female rights. After this concluded we shook hands and took pictures before being escorted by Lord Hayward to the Lobby situated in-between the House of Lords and the House of Commons. This was where MPs and pressure groups came to discuss terms before leaving to their appropriate chambers. Consequently, we were shown to a building which MPs, Lords and Journalists meet to discuss policies. As a result, we saw a number of MPs, Lords and columnists such as the Head Writer of the politics column for the Sunday Times and writers for the Daily Express and Telegraph. Afterwards, we were escorted out and given a farewell by Lord Hayward before heading home.

As a result of going on this trip, I learnt the importance of having both Houses of Parliament to ensure a stable nation and I was impressed by the hard work, commitment and dedication from politicians when involved in political affairs. Although it was extremely busy in the Houses of Parliament, I especially liked how, with the aid of periodic bells used to signal the start of the next chamber session, everything ran in harmony.

#### Thorpe Park Trip – By Ankit Pandey


