On 22 June 2018, both Year 9 Economics classes, (9Ec1 and 9Ec2), went to the Bank of England for the morning. We left school promptly at 9:30am and made our way to Bexley Station to catch the train

the London Bridge. From London Bridge all 40 of us walked to the Bank. Once we arrived at the Bank we had a talk lead by one of the staff at the Bank, where we learnt about the history of it, the many functions of money, inflation and deflation, how money is made and the various security features on our banknotes. Next on the trip agenda was a tour of the Bank's museum. We learnt about the various governors of the Bank and the founder of it in 1696. Finally, we were asked to complete work booklets about the different exhibitions and displays within the museum and, whilst



searching for answers, we discovered a solid gold bar worth over £300,000 and a staggering 13kg in weight! It was interesting to learn that the Bank stored hundreds of similar gold bars in its basement. We were all gifted with Bank of England pens and made our way back to school just in time for lunch. It was a very enjoyable trip and I hope to learn more about the bank in the future!

French Lecturer in School
